KARACHI, NOV 13 /- Twenty Indian fishermen, who were released recently after languishing in Pakistan's Landhijail, will be transported to the Wagah border on Sunday to be handed over to the Indian authorities so that they can return home, a senior official said today.

Prof. Bimal Patel elected to International Law Commission for 5-yr term

UNITED NATIONS, NOV 13 /- Professor Bimal Patel, Vice-Chancellor of the Rashtriya Raksha University and Member of the National Security Advisory Board of India, has been elected to the International Law Commission for a five-year term, in a hard-fought election at the United Nations. Hearty felicitations for Prof. Bimal Patel at Raksha Uni for election to International Law Commission by topping the group. India's Permanent Representative to the UN Ambassador, T S Tirumurti, tweeted on Friday, thanking all UN member states for overwhelling support to India's candidature. Prof. B. Patel, 51, garnered 163 votes in the UN General Assembly out of 192 members present and voting, topping the Asia-Pacific group that included candidates from China, South Korea and Japan. He will serve a five-year term starting January 1, 2022. In the Asia-Pacific group, there were 11 very strong candidates vying for 8 seats, making the election hotly contested.

Professor Bimal Patel of India is elected to the ILC for a 5-year term. Our contribution to ILC will reflect the commitment to uphold rules-based international order, underpinned by Rule of Law, India's Permanent Mission to the UN tweeted, in the backdrop of growing global concern over China's military muscle-flexing in the Indo-Pacific region. Heartfelt gratitude to all countries who reposed their trust in India's candidature with highest votes in Asia-Pacific Group, the mission said.

India topped the group with 163 votes for Patel, followed by 162 votes for Thailand, 154 for Japan, 145 for Vietnam. China could manage 141 votes, followed by 140 for South Korea, 139 for Cyprus and 125 for Mongolia. China is engaged in highly contested territorial disputes in the South and East China Seas. Beijing has also made substantial progress in militarising its main-made islands in the past few years.

Beijing claims almost all of the 1.3 million square-mile South China Sea as its sovereign territory. China has been building military bases on artificial islands in the region which, in parts, is claimed by Brunei, Malaysia, the Philippines, Taiwan and Vietnam. Beijing has impeded commercial activity like fishing and mineral exploration by neighbouring nations in recent years, saying the ownership of the resource-rich maritime territory belongs to China for hundreds of years.

Patel is an esteemed educationalist, jurist and administrator and during his professional career over three decades, he has served in various roles such as the Director at the Gujarat National Law University and member of the 21st Law Commission of India. He has worked for 15 years as global organisations such as the United Nations of Youth and the Organisation for the Prohibition of Chemical Weapons (OPCW) at the Hague, Netherlands, according to his profile on the Rashtriya Raksha University website.

The International Law Commission was established by the General Assembly in 1947 to undertake the mandate of the Assembly to 'initiate studies and make recommendations for the purpose of encouraging the progressive development of international law and its codification. The Statute of the International Law Commission provides that the Commission shall consist of 15 members who shall be persons of recognised competence in international law. The members of the Commission are to be elected by the General Assembly from a list of candidates nominated by the Governments of States Members of the United Nations. (PTI)

Hong Kong authorities deny visa to Economist journalist

HONG KONG, NOV 13 /- Hong Kong authorities declined to renew a visa for a foreign journalist working for The Economist without any explanation, the magazine said.

Sue-Lin Wong, who is Australian, was based in Hong Kong and covered China and the southern semi-autonomous city. We regret their decision... We urge the government of Hong Kong to maintain access for the foreign press, which is vital to the territory's standing as an international city, Zanny Minton Beddoes, The Economist's editor-in-chief, said in a statement Friday. Immigration authorities did not immediately respond to an email request for comment. Phone calls to the information office outside of business hours went unanswered. Many have worried about the erosion of press freedom in a city that was once a bastion for it.

Last week, a survey by the Hong Kong Foreign Correspondents' Club found nearly half its members were considering leaving the city. They said they were concerned about a decline in press freedoms under a sweeping national security law imposed by Beijing following massive anti-government protests in 2019. Very sad I won't be able to continue reporting from Hong Kong. I loved getting to know the city and its people. I will miss you all. Wong said in a message posted on Twitter. Wong previously worked for the Financial Times and Reuters in China.

In August last year, Hong Kong immigration authorities denied a visa to Aaron Mc Nicholas, an incoming editor for Hong Kong Free Press, an independent news outlet, without giving a reason. In June, Apple Daily, the Chinese-language tabloid backed by pro-democracy billionaire Jimmy Lai, was forced to shut down after police froze USD 2.3 million of its assets, searched its office and arrested five top editors and executives. Police also accused the individuals of foreign collusion to endanger national security. (AP)

has made arrangements to safely transport the 20 Indian fishermen to the Wagah border.

Faisal Edhi, the son of late Abdul Sattar Edhi the award winning philanthropist and social worker, said the foundation had made arrangements to send the Indian fishermen through a bus and would also give them gifts and some cash.

They are being released from the Landhijail in Karachi, he said. The fishermen were arrested by the Pakistan Maritime Security Force (PMSF) and handed over to the dock police for allegedly illegally fishing in Pakistani waters. Organisations working to get the poor Indian and Pakistani fishermen lodged in jails in both countries say around 600 Indian fishermen are languishing in Pakistani jails after being arrested by the PMSF.

Yes there are dozens of these poor Indian fishermen in the Landhijail and Malir jails, Faisal confirmed. The jail authority also said the other 350 Indian fishermen would be released in batches once their nationalities are confirmed through the foreign office channels of both countries.

The Pakistan government last year released a number of Indian fishermen in batches as a gesture of goodwill. (PTI)

That talks were moving forward.

A proposal for the overarching decision retains contentious language calling on countries to accelerate efforts towards the phase-out of unabated coal power and inefficient fossil fuel subsidies. But in a new addition, the text says nations will recognize the need for support towards a just transition reference to calls from those working in the fossil fuel industry for financial support as they wind down jobs and businesses. Alok Sharma, the

British official chairing the talks, said he hoped countries would clinch an ambitious agreement in Glasgow. He hoped the colleagues will rise to the occasion, Sharma told The Associated Press as he walked into the conference venue. Some campaign groups said the current proposals were not strong enough. Here in Glasgow, the world's poorest countries are in danger of being lost from view, but the next few hours can and must change the course we are on, said Tracy Cary of Oxfam. What's on the table is still not good enough.

In another proposal, countries are encouraged to submit new targets for emissions reduction for 2035 by 2025, and for 2040 by 2030, establishing a five-year cycle. Previously, developing countries were expected to do so only every 10 years. The proposed agreement states that in order to achieve the 2015 Paris accord's ambitious goal of capping global warming at 1.5 degrees Celsius (2.7 Fahrenheit) by the end of the century compared with pre-industrial times, countries will need to make rapid, deep and sustained reductions in global greenhouse gas emissions, including reducing global carbon dioxide emissions by 45 per cent by 2030 relative to the 2019 level and to net zero around mid-century, as well as deep reductions in other greenhouse gases.

Scientists say this world is not on track to meet that goal yet, but various pledges made before and during the two-week talks, which are now in closure, have brought them closer.

The latest draft agreement expresses alarm and utmost concern that human activities have caused around 1.1C (2F) of global warming to date and that impacts are already being felt in every region. (AP)
